Highly Recommended: Prepare Your Datasets (20 mins.)

Bringing your own SSN datasets to the workshop and formatting it properly is strongly encouraged. Before you come to Atlanta, please prepare your data! To use your data, please

format it before Friday using the guidelines we outline in this section. <u>We may not have much</u> time on Friday morning to do it on-the-fly.

Pre-formatted Example Datasets: Each of these has the same formatting as the data we will use on Friday. US flight network: <u>AirportNodelist.csv</u>; <u>AirportEdgelist.csv</u>. US mafia network: <u>MafiaNodes.csv</u>; <u>MafiaEdges.csv</u>. (You can download either example and cut and paste your own data into it.)

General Guidelines: Each row of the nodelist should represent attributes of a node, including at least a unique node ID and the node's longitude and latitude. Each row of the edge table should represent attributes of an edge, including at least a source and target column corresponding to the node ID. If you work with large SSN datasets, sample your data so that it is less than 200 nodes and 1000 edges, so the software can handle it.

Required attributes for nodelist.csv. (You can have more attributes!)

Required attributes for edgelist.csv. The ID/label name in the source and target column must directly correspond to the node ID in the nodelist.csv file.

R Tool Preparation: Software Installation & Packages

- 1. Download R & R Studio: <u>https://posit.co/download/rstudio-desktop/</u> Youtube: <u>Download R and R Studio for Mac || Download R and R Studio for Windows</u>
- 2. Open R Studio
- 3. Install the development version of `SSNtools` (run scripts in R console):

```
install.packages(devtools)
devtools::install_github("friendlycities-gatech/SSNtools")
library(SSNtools)
```

You can test whether the installation is successful by calling `library(SSNtools)` in your R script.

4. Install required packages for data wrangling and visualization:

While running functions in the `SSNtools` package does not require additional package dependencies, data wrangling and map visualization rely on external packages. Run the following R scripts in your R Studio console. If you are not familiar with these packages, you are encouraged to look them up beforehand.

SNoMaN Tool Preparation: Software Installation & Video

- 1. Launch SNoMaN: SNoMaN is a web-based network visualization tool that does not require downloading or installing. SNoMan is a GUI-based analytic tool that links spatial and network analysis. You can visualize, compute, and compare geographic and network metrics with it. Open the tool here: https://snoman.herokuapp.com/. You can also find it through the SNoMaN website. This software was developed at Georgia Tech.
- 2. Watch a Video: You can watch a video of the software, where we demonstrate how to use the software to analyze a 1960s Mafia Criminal SSN <u>SNoMaN Software</u> <u>Demo.mp4</u>.
- 3. Quick Start: You can find a quick start tutorial here <u>SNoMaN Quick Start</u>, which will guide you to import your own datasets and try the tool. We will demonstrate more complex functionalities of the tool during the workshop.
